Dear Parkland High School Students, Staff and Parents/Guardians,

I wanted to make you aware that we were notified today by the Department of Health that an individual currently under quarantine, associated with our girls' soccer team, that last attended a soccer practice/game on October 19, 2020, has subsequently tested positive for COVID-19. Due to procedures related to privacy laws, I am limited in what I can say. I urge you to also respect the privacy of our students and staff.

The Pennsylvania Department of Health (PA DOH) is monitoring this individual. The PA DOH is responsible for all contact tracing and school district administration has assisted our public health officials with this endeavor. Staff members and students that are determined to be a close contact with the individual will be directly contacted by PA DOH with instructions to quarantine. Close contacts are those who are within 6 feet distance for greater than or equal to 15 minutes with a person identified as a confirmed case with COVID-19. Since this individual was identified as a confirmed case while being under quarantine and the individual had no contact with students or staff at Parkland High School for greater than 2 days before illness onset, there are no close contacts to report.

PA DOH officials have determined there is no need, at this time, to close Parkland High School for students and staff and school will continue as scheduled. The PA DOH will permit the girls soccer team to continue with practice and games.

Anyone experiencing symptoms should self-quarantine and contact your doctor. If you are feeling ill, it is recommended that you separate from others in the home, wear a face mask, cover coughs and sneezes, clean hands and surfaces often, and avoid sharing personal items. It should be emphasized that anyone who is ill should stay home except to get medical care. As you know, virus symptoms can range from mild to severe and could include fever, cough, shortness of breath, chills without a fever, sore throat, muscle aches and pains, and temporary loss of smell or taste. Symptoms may appear in a few as two days or as long as 14 days after exposure.
