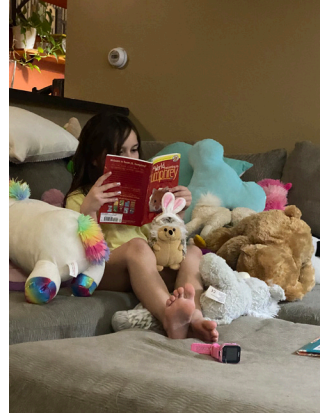

KINDNESS CRUSADE UNITES OUR SCHOOLS

Parkland elementary schools launched Kindness Projects to help unite our community in the fall. The projects were presented at the January School Board Meeting and will be on display at this year's Festival of the Arts on May 21st at Parkland High School. We hope you can join us for that very special event when we will have art on display, festival food for sale, artist vendors and music and dance performances. Here is a list of the special projects that our elementary schools completed:

- Cetronia collected money for Camp Smile, a summer camp for kids with cancer organized by the Pediatric Cancer Foundation of the Lehigh Valley.
- Fogelsville made art to don the walls at a new St. Luke's Pediatric facility.
- Jaindl raised funds to help the Sanctuary at Haafsville, a local animal shelter.
- Kernsville organized a car wash for first responders.
- Veterans Memorial collected shoes, clothing and supplies for foster children and painted kindness rocks for the The Kindness Project, an organization helping foster families that is based in Emmaus.
- Schnecksville organized a Kindness Closet by taking in gently used clothing, washing it and setting up a free shop that allowed families in need to take what they needed at no cost (pictured at right).
- Kratzer created and shared seed pops and planted some in a garden and shared the harvest with community members.
- Ironton collected school uniform pieces for Allentown School District's Ramos Elementary School.
- Parkway Manor students decorated river rocks with positive messages and each class distributed them at locations within the community in hopes of brightening another person's day.

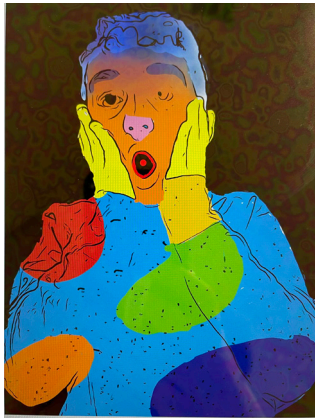

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TEACHER SPOTLIGHT:

MARLANDA BIRNS, ART TEACHER, FOGELSVILLE ELEMENTARY



Back in 2017, proceeds raised from Festival of the Arts were used to provide all Parkland art teachers with iPads and digital pencils. Art teachers then had the opportunity to learn and play with the creative tools, but were unable to scale an idea out to an entire class for students to learn them. Fast forward to this school year when our technology department transitioned 1st graders from iPads to Chromebooks. They then gave the iPads to the art teachers to use with their classes since iPads contain so many creative apps. The pictures at left are an awesome example of how our very creative Fogelsville art teacher, Marlanda Birns, used them with her students. She tested the durability and usability of Logitech Crayons, which are versatile, pixel-precise digital pencils that can be used to draw on iPads. They learned about three famous works of art: *Mona Lisa* by DaVinci, *The Scream* by Munch and *The Thinker* by Rodin. They talked about the cultural references that these three works of art have had on society just because of their pose! For example, Macaulay Culkin strikes the “scream face” in the movie *Home Alone*.

Each student had to ‘strike’ one of the three poses and Mrs. Birns snapped their photo in the Colorscape app. The students then had to transform their pose using the tools within the app. Some of the tools and techniques they had to use were zooming in/out for details, changing brush sizes and blending colors with the use of the Logitech Crayons. The Logitech Crayons added a whole new level of complexity when adding smaller details.

Mrs. Birns was overjoyed with her students’ creativity and the students were very excited to try the Logitech Crayons. She stated, “I feel the lesson was a great success: creativity was achieved, art history was learned and technology was used in the art room.”

SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Parkland Community,

Welcome Spring! This has been a long and cold winter, but spring has sprung and a return to normalcy is abound in Parkland Schools. As of February 14th, masks are no longer required at school. The community shifted from a winter spike in COVID-19 cases to a dramatic decline in cases and transmission rates. This has been welcome news and the students and staff are excited about returning to a more normal environment. The District is pleased to announce that it is planning spring field trips, field days, a Prom and Post Prom Party, 8th Grade trips to Camp Fowler, the 19th Annual Festival of the Arts, elementary spring festivals, senior citizen dinners and so much more as we resume normal operations. While I was so impressed with how our schools were able to build community connections by holding events with staggered visits and outdoor events in the fall, I know everyone is ecstatic to be able to mix and mingle in a more normal way this spring and we are so excited for all that Parkland has in store for this community. Please review this newsletter for information about our many offerings and plan to join us for a concert, activity, class or festival.

Our School Board and Administrative Team are in budget planning mode for the upcoming school year. I am pleased to report that the School Board has already passed a resolution that promises not to exceed the State's Act 1 Index threshold for Parkland of 3.4%. Revenue is trending in a positive direction as real estate values remain strong and our neighbors in corporate industry are performing well. Of course, the rising cost of fuel oil and general supplies is a definite concern for all of us as we prepare to estimate costs for next school year. The Governor has earmarked \$13.5M in Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSERS) funds to help Parkland subsidize learning loss initiatives and infrastructure upgrades in the wake of COVID-19. However, there is uncertainty about the House and Senate adopting the proposal. We are still waiting to see how much will be distributed once the state passes its final budget. Key dates in the budget timeline appear in the box to the left and I invite the community to contact me directly with any questions or concerns related to the budget.

While the pandemic may have slowed things down in certain areas of the economy, I can tell you that construction plans in Parkland have not slowed at all. Schnecksville Elementary School is wrapping up an extensive renovation project and new addition with plans to demolish the original main entrance area this summer. In that entrance space, we will install a wonderful outdoor learning courtyard with a synthetic turf surface that we are confident the staff and students will be able to use extensively. The new Bus Garage/Transportation Office that replaced the one that burned in a fire several years ago was completed in March, offering the ability for our Transportation staff to move on campus from the Troxell Building and now be on site with all of the buses. Furthermore, we will begin an addition to Kratzer Elementary School later this spring to help us account for an increase in student enrollment.

I am happy to report that, in addition to the Kindness Crusade Projects listed on the front page, our 16th Annual District-wide Food Drive was able to occur in February where we collected more than 12,000 items for our school food pantries and school snack pack programs which are given to students in need. Additionally, we successfully completed a Parent Reunification Drill that allowed us to plan for emergencies.

Spring has marked the time when the Parkland Pride Award nomination forms open. I am happy to continue that long-standing tradition and invite community members to nominate Parkland staff or volunteers who have gone the extra mile this school year to make you proud to live in Parkland or be a part of the Parkland staff. You can do that at www.parklandsd.org/ParklandPride.

I am continuing to get to know all of the wonderful people in the Parkland community. In February, I held a Legislator Breakfast to get to know our local lawmakers. As noted in this newsletter, I was part of the team in the District to reach an early agreement with the support staff union that has enabled us to ratify a two-year contract extension. That, alongside the teacher union contract announced last winter, will ensure labor peace for years to come and I am thankful for the collaborative environment that allowed for both of those contracts to be approved by all parties. We have some long-time employees retiring and all four of our core leadership team members will be new within one year, so interviewing and planning how the new organization will operate to best meet this community's future needs has also been a huge priority.

While the school year has been challenging, hope is in the air and our students are doing great things, whether in academic competitions, on the athletic field or on stage. I invite you to follow us on social media to keep abreast of the many achievements.

A FOCUS ON MENTAL HEALTH

ADDRESSING THE NEEDS OF OUR STUDENTS AND STAFF

Mental health has become a major concern for students and adults alike as we've weathered the pandemic. In Parkland, staff have received training with the goal of developing "trauma sensitive school" environments. The focus has been on helping staff understand the warning signs of mental health issues, techniques and protocols in which to address them, and the importance of providing a positive classroom environment for all. Two years ago, Pennsylvania rolled out the Safe2Say Something Anonymous Reporting System, which is state-mandated for all schools. It enables students, teachers, school administrators and others to learn how to detect and report potential threats of violence (to self and others) and other problems before they occur. Once a report is made, it is reviewed by a crisis center analyst, triaged, and sent to law enforcement and school officials (as needed). The key is to make sure the student is safe and that support is provided, if needed. All staff and students receive yearly training about how to utilize this program and our community is utilizing this service.



In Parkland, there are a variety of resources that assist students. At the elementary level, students participate in the *MindUP Program*. This program gives students mental fitness "tools" to utilize when they experience emotional or behavioral challenges. The *MindUP Program* teaches the strategies and skills children need to find optimism, build resilience and create solutions for life's challenges. Each Parkland School has a certified school counselor and school psychologist who incorporate research based programs to assist students with emotional and/or behavioral challenges, traumatic experiences, social skills, self-care and overall wellness. *Student Assistance Program (SAP)* teams are also available in all Parkland Schools for those who are experiencing challenges that may require outside services. The SAP team meets with parents to discuss various outside programs and assists parents in securing those supports.

Supports at the secondary level include SAP and also various seminars that are run by trained school counselors. The seminars include, but are not limited to: *Mindfulness*, *Conflict Resolution*, *Reducing Test-taking Anxiety and Support for Students Exposed to Trauma*. The *More Than Sad Program* is offered during 7th and 9th grade health classes. This is a suicide awareness and prevention program that focuses on helping students understand mental health and where to go for help if they or a friend may need it. The *Mentoring Program* is another program offered at Parkland High School. Students who are referred to this program are paired with a counselor or teacher who provide guidance and supports that may be needed. In addition to these programs, the district partners with St. Luke's to offer YESS Program services. The *YESS Program*, Your Emotional Strength Supported, provides therapy via a licensed St. Luke's clinician at OMS, SMS and PHS during school hours.

If you feel any of these services would benefit your child, please reach out to your child's school counselor. We will have more information for families at our Health and Wellness Symposium on May 14th, 9 AM - 12 Noon, at PHS. Mark your calendar and plan to join us.

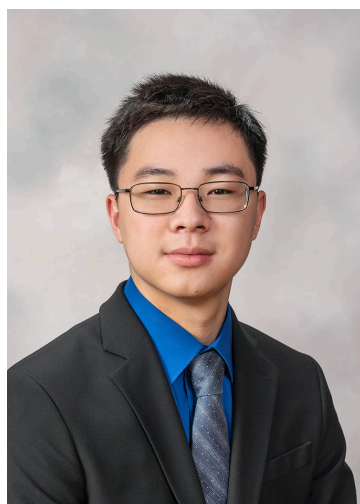

PRESTIGIOUS SCHOLARSHIP WINNERS

VICTOR CAI AND ALEX FORGOSH



Victor Cai represented himself and Parkland in the Regeneron Science Talent Search 2022, a prestigious science and math competition for high school seniors. Scholars were chosen based on their exceptional research skills, commitment to academics, innovative thinking and promise as scientists as demonstrated through the submission of their original, independent research projects, essays and recommendations. The top 40 finalists competed in Washington, D.C. on March 15th where Victor won 2nd place and a \$175,000 scholarship.

Victor created a short-range, narrow-bandwidth radar that calculates distance by transmitting two signals at different frequencies and then measuring the phase difference between them. By combining a multiple frequency continuous wave radar algorithm with software that replaces specialized hardware and then writing additional algorithms to correct inaccurate readings, he created a radar accurate to within 12 cm. Victor's research could help pave the way for more self-driving vehicles on the road with less concern over bandwidth.

Alexander Forgosh is one of 150 high school seniors who will each receive a \$20,000 Coca-Cola college scholarship and join a family of more than 6,600 alumni who are leading positive change in their communities and around the world.

Less than 1/4th of 1% of applicants were chosen to receive this extremely competitive award. The 150 students, who were selected from an initial pool of more than 68,000 applications from across the country, not only exemplify superior leadership, service and academics, they are change agents, positively affecting others in their communities.



Alex is a member of the Lehigh University High School Scholars Program, Lacrosse Team Captain, President of the Latin Club, and Senior Editor and Co-founder of the International Outlook Journal focused on global events and trends. He is the Regional President of Liberty Region BBYO (a Jewish teen movement intended to build the identity of Jewish teens and offer leadership development programs), a firefighter with the Tri-Clover Fire Department, an Intern with *StandWithUs* (an international and non-partisan Israel education organization) and a lifeguard at Kaybrook Swim Club. His volunteer involvement is with the HEADstrong Foundation (a non-profit organization that offers financial, residential and emotional support to families affected by cancer), Lehigh Valley Women's 5K Classic, Israeli National Lacrosse Team and the Boys and Girls Club of Allentown.

TAX REBATE REMINDER FOR SENIORS and Other Qualifying Claimants with Limited Incomes

The Senior Citizens Real Property Tax Rebate allows a portion of property tax dollars to be rebated to senior citizens and other qualifying claimants with limited incomes.

The tax rebate program refunded approximately \$100,000 throughout the community over the last three years.

PARKLAND FINALIZES SUPPORT CONTRACT

The Parkland School District Board of School Directors and the Parkland Education Support Professionals Association (PESPA) reached a two-year contract extension for the period from July 1, 2022 through June 30, 2024. PESPA includes approximately 650 Parkland support staff, including bus drivers, hall monitors, teaching assistants, paraprofessionals, custodial, maintenance, cafeteria, secretarial, computer/data/financial technicians and other part-time support staff.

The contract includes an annual salary increase of 3% for the two-year term of the contract for all employees. Healthcare insurance employee contributions will remain frozen during the two-year period. Bus Drivers will continue to be eligible for bonuses related to the number of days they drive a bus throughout the school year, which is part of a new incentive program that was started in January 2022.

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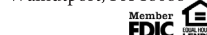
