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

# SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Parkland Community,

As I write this message for the very last time as your Superintendent, I am reminded of the many wonderful people who have made my 26-year journey possible in the Parkland School District. Never could I have imagined that my last year would involve a pandemic, but despite this tremendous challenge, the resiliency, flexibility and perseverance of students, staff, parents, and community members made this a memorable year.

On May 24, we announced to Parkland families that we plan on fully reopening all schools (K-12) next year. The first day of school is scheduled for August 30, 2021. We will still offer a remote option, but students must demonstrate good attendance, good academic standing, and the ability to work independently to qualify for this instructional option. This spring, tutoring sessions were offered to assist all students who may have been falling behind in their academics. In summer, our staff will continue to assist students who may have learning gaps by offering credit recovery summer school as well as literacy and math remediation programs.

DID YOU KNOW?

The Proposed 2021-22 General Fund Budget is \$201,072,623

The Budget includes a 0% tax increase at a mill rate of 15.71 mills

The 2020-21 Budget was also prepared at a 0% tax increase

We are appropriating \$4,509,778 in Fund Balance to offset a larger tax increase which equates to 0.55 mills

Real estate values continue to increase in Parkland which increases District revenue.

As of May 21, 2021, one mill of property tax produces approximately \$8,283,826 at a 97% collection rate

The Board will vote on the final budget during the regularly scheduled Board Meeting on Tuesday, June 22, 2021 at 7 PM.

#### 0% Tax Increase for 2nd Consecutive Year

For the 2nd year in a row, Parkland's School Board has recommended NO INCREASED TAX RATE for the Parkland taxpayers. The allowable tax increase determined by the Act 1 Base Index calculated by the state was 3%, however, Parkland remains sensitive to the fact that our community is recovering from the pandemic. We therefore did everything in our power to hold the line on taxes while putting forth a responsible budget that will meet our educational and operational needs for the upcoming year.

The 2021-2022 Proposed General Fund Budget expenditures are in the amount of \$201,072,623 representing a 4.5% increase over 2020-21 budget expenditures. We will appropriate approximately \$4.5M of Fund Balance to balance the 2021-2022 General Fund Budget. By this action, the Board will offset the need to levy taxes by approximately .55 mills. This budget package has been prepared at a mill rate of 15.71 mills or a 0% millage increase.

Parkland is projected to receive \$11.2M from the American Rescue Plan which will allow our school district to address educational and operational challenges created by the pandemic. This past school year, emergency funds helped offset costs associated with staffing needs resulting from the implementation of fully remote learning opportunities for our students. We also utilized these funds to assist students in the recovery from the more than 12 months of disrupted learning and loss of school routine by implementing summer programs that were described earlier in this message. Additionally, these funds will be utilized to upgrade technology and HVAC systems within the school district. Our focus is to use the resources on one-time expenses, to the greatest extent feasible, to avoid creating deficits in future budget years since this is a non-recurring revenue stream.

#### **Charter School Tuition Concerns**

Enrollment in Pennsylvania's cyber charter schools shot up by 60% during the pandemic, from 38,000 students a year ago to 60,000 students today (Source: Department of Education). The rush of students to cyber charter schools has spurred renewed calls from traditional public school advocates for the state to more closely scrutinize the cost of cyber charters, which perennially log some of the lowest academic performance in the state. Parkland's tuition payments to outside educational institutions, including cyber/charter schools, are expected to rise by approximately 15%, or more than \$2M, for the upcoming year. The pandemic definitely caused a major increase in enrollments and the District has been conducting outreach to families with the intent to win them back to Parkland Schools as we plan to fully reopen all buildings in the fall. Parkland pays tuition fees of \$13,166 for every regular education student and \$28,291 for every student with special needs who attend cyber/charter schools.

#### **Capital Projects**

Due to the debt service management plan initiated by the Parkland Board of School Directors and the Parkland Administration, the District will experience a decrease in debt payments this year. Managing and maintaining facilities is necessary to provide a safe environment for students and staff and to protect the resources within the school district. As a result of careful planning we will continue with the major renovation project at Schnecksville Elementary School, reconstruct the bus garage that burned down in 2018 and improve the parent pickup area at Parkway Manor Elementary School. We are also starting to plan for an addition designed to augment classroom space at Kratzer Elementary School to accommodate enrollment growth as the proposed Ridge Farms development at Cedar Crest Blvd. and Walbert Ave. gets underway.

#### **In-Person Meetings Resume in June**

In June, the School Board will resume in-person meetings. The Final Budget vote will occur on Tuesday, June 22, 2021 at 7 PM in the Administration Center Board Room at 1210 Springhouse Rd., Allentown, PA 18104. We are also happy to announce that our facilities will reopen for recreational and community use in mid-June.

In closing, I wish to thank the entire community for your support. It has been my highest honor to serve as your Superintendent of Schools and I extend my best wishes for future success to Dr. Mark Madson as our new superintendent. I wish to thank the Parkland Board of School Directors, our Administrative Team, our fantastic staff, our taxpayers and of course our students, who continue to inspire excellence and never cease to amaze me. Thank you all for making Parkland School District a Top Workplace and a wonderful place to spend most of my career in education. I was truly blessed.

#### HOW EACH DOLLAR SUPPORTS PROGRAMS IN THE

#### **INSTRUCTIONAL PROGRAMS 63.76 CENTS**

Instruction includes all activities dealing directly with the interaction between teachers and students and related costs which can be directly attributed to a program of instruction. Costs encompass all programs including regular classroom instruction, special education, early intervention services, vocational education, remediation services, driver education, required payments to charter/cyber schools, and support of the Community College. Related costs include instructional expenditures for salaries and benefits (teachers, substitutes, and teacher aides), contracted services, new and replacement equipment, supplies, books, maintenance costs directly attributable to instructional equipment and other expenses such as sabbatical leaves.

#### **INSTRUCTIONAL SUPPORT SERVICES 27.88 CENTS**

This category includes the cost of all services which provide administrative, technical, and logistical support to facilitate and enhance instruction.

INSTRUCTIONAL - This area includes pupil personnel, guidance counseling, and student accounting services. It also includes the District's library, audio-visual and computer-assisted instruction programs, curriculum development and the professional development and training for the instructional staff.

ADMINISTRATION - The administration of the educational program includes all board expenses, salaries and supplies of the central administration, principals and their clerical employees, as well as the costs for tax collection services. This area also includes legal and programming services and the generation of computerized report cards and class scheduling.

PUPIL HEALTH - This area includes all expenditures related to health services provided by the District, including salaries of physicians, school nurses and health room aides along with medical and dental equipment and supplies.

BUSINESS/FISCAL - Those activities that involve the fiscal operations of the District are included in this category. This includes salaries, supplies and contracted services associated with budgeting, purchasing and disbursing, financial accounting, payroll, asset inventory, and auditing as well as district postage, advertising and data processing costs.

OPERATIONS/MAINTENANCE – This includes the salaries of all employees involved in plant maintenance and operations, maintenance and custodial supplies, heating fuel, utilities (water, sewer, natural gas, electric, telephone), property insurance, equipment for buildings, vehicle maintenance and buildings and grounds upkeep.

#### Attention Parkland School District Property Owners

The 2021-2022 Parkland School District Real Estate tax bills will be mailed on or after July 1, 2021. Any property owner not receiving a bill by July 10, 2021 should contact their respective township tax collector. Property owners who have taxes paid by a mortgage company or other lender should forward their bill to the lending institution as soon as possible to avoid penalties.

### Parkland Homestead/Farmstead Gaming Credit

Gaming monies in the form of property tax relief will offset property taxes by approximately \$110.77 per approved homestead and/or farmstead in the Parkland School District. This assessed value reduction will be shown on your 2021-22 property tax bill which will be mailed to all property owners on or after July 1, 2021.

#### 2021-22 PARKLAND SCHOOL DISTRICT BUDGET

TRANSPORTATION – Pupil transportation expenses include all costs associated with transporting students to public and non-public schools on district-operated buses.

CENTRAL – This area includes activities other than general administration which support each of the other instructional and supporting services. These include public information services such as the District Newsletter, human resources, planning and research, and system-wide technology services.

OTHER - The district's support of the Intermediate Unit's Administrative Budget as well as instructional material services.

#### **NON-INSTRUCTIONAL SERVICES 1.19 CENTS**

STUDENT ACTIVITIES – This budget area includes the salaries of advisors for student activities, coaches' salaries for athletic programs, athletic equipment, supplies, contracted services, and student accident insurance.

**COMMUNITY SERVICES** – Contributions to the Lehigh Valley Business Education Partnership, as well as costs to provide crossing guards are expended from this budget area.

#### OTHER FINANCING USES 7.17 CENTS

DEBT SERVICE/FUND TRANSFERS - This category covers principal and interest payments on bond issues for school building construction, capital projects, educational technology, and bus purchases.

REFUND OF PRIOR YEAR'S RECEIPTS - Payments made from the current budget for refunds of prior year expenditures.


BUDGETARY RESERVE - These funds are used for unanticipated or emergency expenditures not provided elsewhere in the budget. Included are expenditures for unanticipated state and federal grants for which expenditures are not yet allocated by program.

# HOW DO I CALCULATE MY TAXES?

The 2021-22 Final General Fund Budget Plan calls for a property tax rate of 15.71 mills. To calculate your school district property tax, find the current assessed value of your property and multiply that value times the millage rate of 15.71. For example, a house assessed at the median value of a home in Parkland, which is \$228,300, would be calculated as follows:

 $$228,300 \times .01571 = $3,586.59$  property tax for the school district.

Gaming monies will supply every approved homestead/farmstead with a property tax reduction of approximately \$110.77. This will be clearly marked on your tax bill. Gaming monies do not offset the real estate tax levied to fund the Parkland Community Library.


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


# STUDENT SPOTLIGHT: TARIQ SHAHID



Meet Tariq Shahid, a student at Springhouse Middle School who is excelling in many areas. He is highlighted on the facing page for being part of the State Champion Science Olympiad Team, winning a seat at the National Competition of National History Day in June for his work on creating an award-winning group website and won a 1st Place Award at the prestigious Delaware Valley Science Competition that is comprised of competitors from New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Delaware. While there, Tariq won a Gold Medal for his science fair project, a first for any student ever in the Lehigh Valley! **The Gold Medal signifies the best middle school project entered by any student from across the three aforementioned states.** His chemistry project "Computational Analysis of the Effect of Absorbents on CO2 using COMSOL Multiphysics Simulation Engine" focuses on carbon capture technology. He first came up with the idea after Elon Musk

announced a \$100M prize for the best carbon capture technology. He began researching it and became interested in performing an experiment related to how carbon capture technology removes CO2 from the atmosphere, contributing to the reversal of climate change. Although he originally wanted to conduct his experiment physically, because of COVID-19, he was unable to do so. Instead, he taught himself a software called COMSOL Multiphysics which allowed him to run the experiment computationally. Tariq is excited to take Computer Science courses at Parkland High School next year and further his education in programming. He also said that he enjoys playing the violin in the Orchestra at school and is looking forward to the wide array of opportunities that await him at Parkland High School. Congratulations, Tariq! We can't wait to watch you grow and reach your fullest potential.




# **BOOK QUEST CHALLENGE**
